
October Trivia

Going back generations, chiseling ghoulish grins into turnips, radishes, and potatoes was a common practice in Ireland and other Celtic nations. This spooky tradition was part of Samhain, an ancient pagan festival meaning "summer's end," which later evolved into All Hallow's Eve on October 31st. The Celts believed that the lanterns would ward off the spirits of the dead, who were

thought to mingle with the living.

In Germany, the first Octoberfest was held on October 12, 1810, to celebrate the royal marriage of Prince Ludwig to Princess Therese. Beginning in 1811, organizers introduced an agricultural show to the event to promote the traditions of Bavarian agriculture and to boost the economy for farmers.


